Cambridge IGCSE at GIGIS - Gateway to the World

I've been working with the UK's GCSE since it was first introduced in the late 1980's and have seen hundreds - or possibly thousands - of students through this world-recognised programme or its international equivalent, the IGCSE.

Naturally in that time I've honed the approaches and methods that yield the optimum results which open the doors to A Level, IB or direct admission to the university foundation programmes across the globe. And this has sometimes been achieved in countries where the educational infrastructure is not as it is in Singapore: many of my ex-students from Burma, Thailand, Malaysia and Cambodia are now pursuing life-transforming higher education and employment opportunities in the US, UK, Canada and Australia. Having met our students at GIGIS I know already that they are well on course to go beyond these even these stellar achievements. Why do I say this? Well, firstly, since my arrival we've been working on building our Secondary/IGCSE team for 2022 and onwards, and soon I'll be happy to introduce a new colleagues whose subject knowledge, pedagogical skills and attitudes will optimise both the learner's academic attainment but also the quality of in-class experience, enhancing the effective team we have already established in Maths and Science.
